Exhibition Guide

OUT OF ICE is a single installation and this guide details the individual component parts of the work, at the entrance level on the mezzanine level, and in the main gallery space below.

A. Main entrance, mezzanine level

The mezzanine level entrance to *OUT OF ICE* is a portal to the main installation, presenting four short films, and two film projections:

The freestanding wall at the entrance to Ambika P3 is a projection of an ice wall filmed at the Greenlandic Icecap during an expedition out of Kangerlussuaq, with filmmaker Rob Page in April 2013. Duration: 10 mins (looped).

The four projected films portray the human perspective of climate change, as experienced by the Inuit, and filmed in and around Ilulissat and Oqaatsut, Northern Greenland in 2013:

Film 1 Two Inuit explorers, filmed in April, 2013. Duration: 10 mins (looped). Film 2 An Inuit Halibut fisherman in the icescape,

filmed in April 2013. Duration: 14 mins (looped). Film 3 An Inuit skipper navigating through the ice floes, filmed in 2013. Duration: 15 mins (looped)

Film 4 A young Inuit filmed on the sea ice in his native Oqaatsut in April 2013. Duration: 12mins (looped).

At the far end of the mezzanine level is a film projection shot among the ice floes of the great Sermeq Kujalleq Glacier, Ilulissat, North West Greenland, in April 2013. Duration: 15 mins (looped).

B. Main Gallery

Descend using the stairs to:

Two pools of water 11m x 12m, ice, projections, theatre lights, viewing decks, seating.

The first part of the installation includes three film projections on a continuous loop at the end of a still pool:

Film1 shows the ice floes off Ilulissat. Northern Greenland in April 2013.
Film2 is a digital work created by one of Ogilvie's collaborators Tom DeMajo, reflecting the temporal and crystalline structural elements of ice as it forms.
Film3 was shot in the artist's studio, and shows the processes of ice melt.

The second part of the installation has continuous real time projections overlooking a large pool. Using powerful theatre lights, drops of ice meltwater are projected onto the walls by way of refraction and reflection, and
